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Introduction

The world of information delivery changes almost daily. The University of Connecticut Libraries' staff responds to advances in information technology by adapting its services and spaces to meet the needs of contemporary instructors, researchers, and students. The Libraries also contributes to the University's public engagement and diversity aspirations in important ways.

The Libraries performed remarkably well in satisfying faculty and student information needs this year. Based on a standardized library service quality assessment survey administered in November 2010, the UConn Libraries outperformed libraries at all eight of the University's peers, improving scores at each UConn library location and scoring higher on all 22 questions than our 2008 scores.

Some of the Libraries' innovations and achievements in 2010/2011 included:

Undergraduate Education

Virtual Reference Service

Virtual reference service is now directly embedded into our primary book discovery tool (UConn WorldCat) and many of our most heavily used research tools. As a consequence, virtual reference traffic quickly surpassed in-person reference questions.

Supporting UConn's GEOC Competencies

The Language and Cultural (LC) Center was added, offering both language tutoring and a location for foreign language/cultural clubs (e.g., the Arab Students Club) to meet on a regular basis. With this addition, the Learning Commons reaches its goal of representing all five GEOC competencies.

Collaborations with Undergraduate Education

Electronic Classroom 1 in Babbidge Library was redesigned and significantly enhanced and expanded through a partnership with the Institute for Teaching & Learning. Q and W Center staff relocated to space adjacent to the Learning Commons. The collaborative hiring of a full-time media technician improved the functionality and dependability of library media equipment.

Improving Course Reserve Services

The Library acquired and implemented the ARES software to better integrate online course reserve materials program directly into HuskyCT. The new software empowers instructors to add online course readings and streaming media to HuskyCT and provides them with data on student usage of course reserves materials.

GeoCommons

The Libraries opened a geospatial data and mapping-focused space that provides undergraduate students with mapping and geospatial software that allows them to work collaboratively and advance their information and geographic literacy skills.

Mobile Computing Support

The Library added electrical outlets to Bookworms Café and Levels 1 and 4 in Babbidge Library, allowing more students to charge their mobile devices while working in the library.

Regional Campus Libraries' Learning Commons Improvements

Further improvements occurred in the Learning Commons spaces at Greater Hartford and Avery Point and a Learning Commons at Stamford was planned. New copiers and Book Scan machines were installed at each library to enable free public scanning. Wireless printing was implemented to enable students to print from their laptop computers.

Graduate & Professional Education/Research, Scholarship & Creative Activity

Graduate Study Center

A Graduate Study Center was created in Babbidge Library, accessible only to graduate students, offering group study spaces, individual study spaces, collaborative spaces, and lounge seating.

Connecticut State Data Center

The Libraries' Map and Geographic Information Center (MAGIC) took over the Connecticut State Data Center from the Geography Department this year. MAGIC now provides user friendly access to Connecticut's census data and offers users the ability to map census data elements into a variety of geographic projections.

Workshops for Faculty and Graduate Students

Library staff conducted workshops and instructional sessions related to author's rights, open access, copyright, RefWorks, census data, citation analysis, and current awareness tools as well as two workshops in conjunction with staff from the Office of Sponsored Programs and UITs on Data Management for Grant Funded Projects (e.g., NSF requirement).

Research Highlights @ Noon

Library staff hosted 10 Research Highlights @ Noon presentations to showcase faculty and graduate students' research in the sciences, social sciences, and humanities.

Digital Projects

For the fourth consecutive year, the UConn Libraries contributed 500,000 pages of unique digitized material to the Open Content Alliance. Library staff incorporated new open source software to ingest and begin to preserve born digital Archives & Special Collections materials. The delivery of library resources to mobile devices including iPads and iPhones, Androids, and Blackberries was also begun.

Institutional Repository Growth

The DigitalCommons@UConn, the University’s institutional repository, grew from 6,189 documents to 7,496 or 21 percent this year. In addition to digital faculty contributions, the Libraries worked with the Graduate School to add Master’s theses this year.

The Sudan and Darfur Research Collections Online Portal

This collaboration between University Archives & Special Collections and UConn’s Human Rights Institute was completed in May with guidance from the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum in Washington, D.C. and actress and human rights activist Mia Farrow.

Document Delivery/Interlibrary Loan

UConn WorldCat now seamlessly integrates monograph holdings from the UConn Libraries, the Boston Library Consortium Libraries, and the global WorldCat Libraries. Users can easily request circulating items held by any WorldCat library and receive a long term loan for their learning or research needs. In addition, UConn’s 19,778 journal article requests submitted through RapidILL were received in an average of 15.4 hours.

Scan on Demand

We now provide the UConn community with free scanned copies of articles and chapters held in our local print collections. This new service provides researchers with rapid desktop delivery of any locally held article or chapter they require.

Public Engagement

Library Workshops and Instructional Sessions

Library staff provided workshops and sessions in support of UConn’s Early College Experience (ECE), Research Experience for Undergraduates (REU), American English Language Institute (UCAELI), First Year Experience (FYE), Administrator Preparation Program (UCAPP), and UConn Connects programs.

K-12 Partnerships

Library staff initiated partnerships with two Teaching American History grant projects at Shelton and Windham area schools, conducted information sessions for high school media specialists, and had preliminary discussions with Southington area schools. Library staff also provided instruction and research support for two Early College Experience classes based at John F. Kennedy High School in Waterbury and, jointly with the Admissions Department, provided Granville Academy seniors an introduction to college research.

Campus Collaborations

In collaboration with the School of Business and the Continuing Studies Program, library staff offered a workshop entitled “Young Entrepreneurs of Kenya,” sponsored by the Department of State and aimed at providing business skills to young entrepreneurs from that country.

Osher Lifelong Learning Institute

Library staff provided a series of library and technology-themed workshops to members of the Osher Lifelong Learning Institute at the Waterbury campus, an academic cooperative that provides mature adults 50 and over with opportunities for intellectual development, cultural stimulation, and social interaction.

All in a Day's Work: Photographs of Women in Connecticut History

This traveling exhibit of 22 historical images from University Archives & Special Collections was displayed at two regional campuses and Storrs this year and will travel to the other three regional campuses next year. A panel discussion related to the exhibit was held on the Waterbury campus in March, a symposium on the Avery Point Campus in April, and was featured in local print and digital media as well as UConn Today.

Entrepreneurship Boot Camp for Veterans

The Business Librarian collaborated with the School of Business on the Entrepreneurship Boot Camp for Veterans, a national initiative to support veterans returning from Iraq and other areas of conflict. This initiative assists veterans in starting their own businesses.

Diversity

Minority Recruitment and Retention

The Libraries completed 13 searches in 2010/2011. Of the 13 staff recruited, five are minorities, raising the Libraries' number of minority staff to 20 of 103 total staff, or more than 19 percent. The Libraries also have a 100 percent five year retention rate for permanently hired minority staff during the last 10 years.

Public Programming

The Library collaborated with other organizations on campus to sponsor and promote diversity. Library staff worked with at least 10 different cultural centers/organizations and participated in more than 20 different diversity-related events, ranging from helping navigate census data to reflect changes in Connecticut's Hispanic population to a panel discussion of women in academia for Women's History Month.

Promoting Diversity

The Libraries' Diversity Advisory Team created a LibGuide promoting the use of library collections and resources focused on diversity. The Libraries' diversity website also was edited to reflect current resources and events on campus.

Collections

The library provided guidance in selecting material for a new School of Social Work course: Social Work Practice within the Military Sector. Because women are a growing presence in the military, material dealing specifically with this population was identified and added to the list of basic readings. Collections related to specific diversity events were displayed, including Hispanic Heritage Month, Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.'s birthday, and Women Poets for National Poetry Month.
